The Need For Rural Ministers

75% of Cumberland Presbyterian Churches in Arkansas serve rural communities. Many struggle to find ordained CPC pastors to preach and to provide for their congregations.

Rural pastors are often bivocational, or are called to preach as a second career. Candidates find their seminary education a financial challenge.

To become ordained these men and women are required to take master degree level course work, often while supporting a family and working full time.

The vision of the Gentry Scholarship Endowment is to use the interest from the fund to award scholarships to PAS candidates who have a heart for rural ministry.



Program of Alternate Studies

The Cumberland Presbyterian Church offers two tracts for ordination as a ministry. The primary method is a Master of Divinity degree (MDiv) from an accredited seminary.


Because some canidates fro the ministry hear God's call when an MDiv is very difficult to ear, for example, when called in the prime of their careers, when they are raising a family, or when nearing retirement. For those, the church offers a second tract for ordination, the Program of Alternate Studies.

The Gentry Scholarship Endowment nutures PAS candidates so that they are able to complete their education and begin serving a church.

Rev. Dale Gentry

Rev. Dale Gentry, a Cumberland
Presbyterian minister, started his
preaching at the age of 18. His ministry
to rural churches spanned 74 years.
He served as many as eight churches
in southeast Arkansas, simultaneously.
In the 1950's he was the only active
minister in Bartholomew Presbytery, at
one time serving every church in its
bounds.

Much of this time, Bro. Dale was a postal worker, teacher, coach, and school principal, in addition to preaching.

He continued his ministry until the age of 91. He preached his last sermon at Newton Chapel in Cornervill, AR.

Bro. Dale held revivals throughout the summer anywhere he was called.
